A TIME FOR CHANGE

The Greek language, the language of the New Testament, has two words for time. The first is CHRONOS...physical time, it is 10:48am on Monday. The second is KAIROS...which translates as the "right time" or an "opportune moment". Jesus's birth in Bethlehem was a KAIROS MOMENT.

I believe COTC stands at a KAIROS MOMENT. Beginning in March, 2020 COTC has been in a time of transition. We have been living and operating in the midst of a pandemic, a beloved Senior Pastor retired after many years of faithful service, a new Interim Senior Pastor has arrived, and now COTC is slowly beginning to return to a semblance of "normal". It has been a roller coaster season on many levels.

The Vision Statement of COTC states: "To know Christ, and make Him known to the next generation." Since so much that was normal has been upended, the Session at its May 10, 2021 meeting unanimously voted to seize this KAIROS MOMENT to make a major change to our Sunday morning line up. Beginning on Sunday, September 12, 2021 COTC will provide the following worship and educational opportunities:

8:00am - Traditional Celebration of Worship in the Sanctuary

9:00am - Contemporary Celebration of Worship in the Covenant Center

10:00am - A time of education for all ages

11:00am - Traditional Celebration of Worship in the Sanctuary

The Session believed strongly this was the KAIROS MOMENT to make this change. The change makes a renewed commitment to education in response to our Vision Statement. The Session wants to make sure that Christian Education is a vital part of who we are.

I am fully aware that change is never easy. I am also fully aware that not everyone will be happy with the changes. But this change seems to be necessary if we are going to help the next generation know Christ. This is our mission, this is our vision, this is who we are!!!

There will be a lot more information coming out about this upcoming change, so stayed tuned.

My personal invitation to you is that you set your alarm a little earlier on Sunday, September 12th and plan to join us for an exciting new part of the journey. God is up to something wonderful at COTC, I pray you will continue to be a vital part of the COTC family.

Sermon Title: FROM COPING TO CONQUERING

Preaching: Pastor Dan

Scripture: 2 Corinthians 4:5-12

Focal Verse: "We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed;

perplexed, but not despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but

not destroyed." vv. 8-9.

Synopsis: Paul discovered in his weakness the immeasurable strength of God. That's good news for our lives. We cannot only cope, but we can conquer. How? By the transcendent power of God working in our lives, turning opposition into opportunity.



Sermon Title: MUSTARD OR CATCH-UP?

Preaching: Pastor Scott Scripture: Mark 4:26-34

Focal Verse: "It is like a grain of mustard seed, which, when sown on the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth, yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes larger than all the garden plants and puts out large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade." vv. 31 & 32.

Synopsis: The Kingdom of God is a kingdom of growth. It grows in numbers and magnitude, but it also consists of individual growth. The Kingdom is not static, and neither should we be.

Sermon Title: A NEW DADDY

Preaching: Pastor Dan

Scripture: 2 Corinthians 5:14-21

Focal Verse: "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come!" v. 17.

Sermon Title: FINDING CALM IN THE STORM

Synopsis: The message we need to hear in the midst of this crazy world is that there is One who quiets the winds and stills the waves. There is One who speaks to our hearts and if we listen, there is One who will calm our fearful spirits.





UPDATE FROM THE PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE

At the end of April, the Presbyterian Church, USA (PCUSA) published our church's Ministry Information Form (MIF) on its website. You will recall that the MIF is a document outlining, for prospective pastors, the qualities, experience, and character traits The Church of the Covenant is seeking in a Senior Pastor.

As of this writing in mid-May, our MIF has been viewed 111 times and we have received 14 resumes from prospective candidates for our position. The resumes, called Personal

Information Forms (PIFs), are carefully studied by each member of the PNC. The Committee has developed an evaluation system that allows each member of the PNC to grade the prospective candidate's qualifications. Some examples of the material that is reviewed for each candidate include, educational and work background, church leadership experience, references, and the candidates' narrative responses to several questions about their beliefs, faith, successes, and personal growth as servants of the Lord.

In the weeks ahead the PNC will refine the list of possible candidates in order to obtain further information from them by means of phone and face-to-face interviews. Because of technological advances and online communication, the Committee members now are able to gather information about candidates by looking at the websites of their current churches, by listening to their sermons online, and by reading materials they have published.

The candidates that the PNC has reviewed thus far are all, on paper, excellent Ministers of the Word and Sacrament and most are qualified for the position they seek. But the process of discerning God's will about who is the BEST qualified candidate for our Senior Pastor's position will be exacting and time-consuming. The PNC believes that while God has chosen the person who will serve as our next Senior Pastor, He did not feel compelled to make the search process easy and quick. We ask for your prayers and patience and we'll keep you informed of our progress.

USHER SUPPORT NEEDED

God is at work around the world in amazing ways. The Antioch Partners

In 2006 Frontier Fellowship and The Outreach Foundation, two mission organizations that have been serving Presbyterian congregations for many years, established a strategic alliance that was subsequently named The Antioch Partners (TAP). TAP comes alongside and helps send those who are being called by God to long-term, cross-cultural, incarnational ministry.

Earlier this year we had the privilege of meeting a young Presbyterian minister (incidentally the son of a Presbyterian minister who serves a church north of Pittsburgh) who has responded to God's call to mission on foreign soil through TAP. His faith and energy radiated even on a Zoom call. He will depart the end of May to serve in ministry that is security-sensitive, and he asks that we pray for those whom God will put in his way and for his family as he leaves them to serve God in the world.

Through our support of this young missionary, we affirm our belief in the "proclamation of the kingdom among unreached peoples and the strengthening of the church for God's mission in the world."

This young pastor has made it clear that his journeys abroad and his walk with Jesus have led him to develop a heart to love refugees and to see them find abundant life. May he succeed. 2021 Mission support - \$1,000



THE CARNAHAN LIBRARY

Dedicated on 11/1/09 to the memory of Thomas Dorrington Carnahan II, Thomas Dorrington Carnahan III, George Kirk Carnahan and to the glory of God.

Hours: Monday – Friday 9:00 am – 3:00 pm and Sunday 8:30 am – 12:30 pm

The following books were donated to the library. The Library Committee thanks the donors. All have been cataloged and are ready to be checked out. The library is in Room 308, the first room on the right as you enter the third floor hallway from the elevator. The card catalog will help you to locate a book by author, title or subject.

The following seven (7) books are given in memory of Peg Flynn by The Monday Readers:

<u>The Soul of America: The Battle for Our Better Angels</u> by Jon Meacham.

The author helps us understand contentious periods in our history by explaining how presidents and citizens came together to defeat the forces of anger, intolerance, and extremism. There are 7 chapters and each one focuses on a certain period of time in our country's history. For example, Chapter 2 covers the end of the Civil War, the beginning of the Ku Klux Klan and Reconstruction. Lincoln once said that "the better angels of our nature" have repeatedly won the day.

The Midnight Library by Matt Haig. In this interesting novel, the idea is put forth that between life and death, there is a library. The main character is Nora Seed, a woman whose life has been full of misery and regret. When she finds herself in the Midnight Library, she has a chance to make things right. With the help of an old friend, she can now undo every decision she regrets as she tries to work out her perfect life. Before long, her choices place the library and herself in extreme danger.

(The book has been on the Bestsellers list for many weeks.)

The Daughters of Kobani by Gayle Tzemach Lemmon. This non-fiction book tells the story of an all-female militia in the town of Kobani in northeastern Syria that faced off against Isis in 2014 in an attempt that focused on women's rights. These women were part of the Kurdish military that fought side by side with the United States. The women earned the respect of our special operations forces. (*The library has another book by the author entitled "The Dressmaker of Khair Khana"*.

Ordinary Grace by William Kent Krueger. The main character of this novel is a 13 year old boy named Frank Drum who lives in a small town in MN. It takes place in 1961. During a series of events that summer, he is forced to demonstrate maturity beyond his years. 40 years later, he tells the story of that time and the enduring grace of God.

Four Hundred Souls edited by Ibram X. Kendi and Keisha N. Blain. Ms. Blain is currently a history professor at Pitt. This book represents the 400 year history of African Americans from 1619 to the present. 90 different writers tell about a brief period of the 400 years. Each entry is short in describing what occurred during a 5 year period. It's a great way for any reader to learn the history of African Americans in a well presented and readable style. (*This book was on the Best-sellers list for many weeks.*)

The Beauty of What Remains by Steve Leder. The author is the senior rabbi of a very large synagogue in Los Angeles. It was written after his first major loss, the death of his father. This comforting book takes the reader on a journey through the experience of loss. He explains how death teaches us how to live and love more deeply by showing us not only what is gone but also the beauty of what remains. He shares the stories of members of his congregation who consulted him for guidance after they had received a serious health diagnosis as well as his having to console parents after the loss of a child. It's a book that can be referred to again and again as the reader experiences the loss of special people.

The Paris Library by Janet Skeslien Charles. This novel is based on the events and actual people who worked at the Paris Library during WWII. The main character is a young Parisian woman named Odile who works at the Paris Library both before and during the war. Then we read about her later life in Montana which becomes her home after she marries at the end of the war. The other character is a lonely teenager named Lily who befriends Odile, her elderly neighbor who keeps very much to herself. (*This book has been on the Bestsellers List for several weeks.*)

The following books were newly purchased for the library:

The Light in Hidden Places by Sharon Cameron. Poland was invaded by the Nazis in 1939. A young Catholic girl named Stefania had been working in a grocery store owned by a Jewish family since she was 12. However, when the German Army invaded the small town they lived in when Stefania was 16, the Jewish family was sent to the ghetto. A short time later, one of the sons of the Jewish family escaped and arrived at her apartment to ask if he could hide there. In time, the 3 of them found a larger house on another street. Before long, Stefania and her younger sister were hiding 13 Jews in the attic of this house. This story is based on true events. It keeps the reader on edge.

Bridgerton (The Duke and I) by Julia Quinn. This fictional book was made into a very successful series on Netflix in 2020. It takes place in the early 1800's in London.
