

APRIL PREACHING AND WORSHIP SCHEDULE

April 1, 2021 (Communion) (Maundy Thursday, Service at 7:00 PM in the Sanctuary)

Sermon Title: LOVE BEYOND MEASURE

Preaching: Pastor Scott Scripture: John 13:31b-35

<u>Focal Verse</u>: "By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." v. 35. <u>Synopsis</u>: Jesus' command to love one another sounds simple enough, but we have great difficulty fulfilling that command. It is easy to find reasons to not love another person. Jesus' command includes the statement "as I have loved you." This may seem impossible given the level of love He has shown. Imagine how different the world would look if we worked our hardest to follow through.

April 2, 2021 (Good Friday, Service at Noon in the Commons)

Sermon Title: "WOMAN BEHOLD YOUR SON!"

Preaching: Pastor Dan Scripture: John 19: 16-37

<u>Focal Verse</u>: "Near the cross of Jesus stood his mother, his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Cleopas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus saw his mother there, and the disciple whom he loved standing nearby, he said to his mother, 'Dear woman, here is your son,' and to the disciple, 'Here is your mother,' from that time on, this disciple took her into his home." vv. 25-27.

Synopsis: There is something infinity moving in the fact that Jesus in the agony of the Cross, when the salvation of the world hung in the balance, thought of the loneliness of His mother and His "beloved" disciple in the days ahead. Jesus never forgot the duties that lay in His hands.

April 4, 2021 (Communion) (Easter Sunday)

Sermon Title: "A REALITY CHECK..."

Preaching: Pastor Dan Scripture: John 20:1-18

<u>Focal Verse</u>: "Mary Magdalene went to the disciples with the news: "I have seen the Lord!"

And she told them that he had said these things to her." v. 18.

Synopsis: Easter Sunday changes our reality maps concerning death and the means of

life. An enemy becomes a friend. A stone has been rolled away. Is it time for a reality check in your life?

April 11, 2021

Sermon Title: THE FIRST MISSIONARY

Preaching: Pastor Scott Scripture: John 20:19-22

Focal Verse: "As the Father has sent me, even so I am sending you." v.21.

Synopsis: We are not called to sit still and wait for the Lord to finish His work of building His kingdom here on this earth. We have been commissioned to go, to share the message of hope in Christ. Maybe we can learn a few lessons from the first missionary in the long lines of missionaries in the church.

April 18, 2021

Sermon Title: "GET YOUR THIRD CLASS TICKETS HERE!"

Preaching: Pastor Dan Scripture: Acts 1:6-14

UPDATE FROM THE PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE

The PNC has received the results of the Holy Cow Survey in which many of you participated. As you will recall from taking the survey, it covered a lot of topics. With the help of a representative from the Holy Cow Consulting company, the PNC is now reviewing the results in order to discern the congregation's intent for the future direction of our church and for the type of pastor who can best lead us.

The PNC will next prepare the Ministry Information Form (MIF) that, once approved by the Session and the Washington Presbytery, will tell prospective pastors about our church. The MIF preparation will be informed by the results of the Holy Cow survey. Accordingly, your input—through the survey—will have an influence on the first impression prospective pastors will have of The Church of the Covenant.

Many thanks to all who participated in the survey. Your opinions, comments, ideas, and concerns have been noted and are greatly appreciated. They will be significant factors in the continuing life of our congregation and in our church's ability to effectively serve Christ in our community and world.

THE DREAMERS COMPANY

"The restoration of a community always begins with a dream."

With warmer weather and the urge to get outside, we begin to think about pruning, cleaning, and painting. The Dreamers Company is way ahead of us. With the mission of restoration at their backs, Dreamers (begun locally in 2014) has taken to the very streets of Washington, Pennsylvania, to rehabilitate and beautify, to bring back vibrancy and

dignity. Earnest about community collaboration, Dreamers specializes in project and workforce development with community leaders, even as it galvanizes volunteers.

Over the past several years, Dreamers has addressed blight removal and rehabilitation of over 70 homes and 3 playgrounds in the City of Washington. Volunteers, including church youth groups and their leaders, clean, weed, plant, remove overgrowth, spread mulch, and replace old, hazardous equipment and lighting at playgrounds. The resulting positivity and pride are tremendous to our area. Aaron Miller, a board member and a founder of Dreamers, shared an update of initiatives for 2021:

Play Washington—Refurbishment of 7th Ward playground with new equipment which will allow better programming during the summer,

Mission Washington—The week of June 22nd, there will be close to 100 volunteers working to help beautify the community as well as help to renovate homes for those in need.

Beautify the City—Dreamers will continue to create opportunity for art and murals in the downtown of Washington. This also includes clean-up days 2 or 3 times a year.

What began as a dream is turning into impressive community improvement. Our Church of the Covenant youth, past participants in Mission Washington, might once again respond to the call. Ah, spring.



Simple moments. Quiet moments. Moments missed by many, but created by God, forever punctuating the timeline of history. You can't open the Gospels without reading about them. Mary watches her baby boy in a feeding trough and ponders, "How can this really be God?" The apostles stare at a lunch bucket of loaves and fish that never goes empty. The leper sees new fingers appear where only nubs had been and runs back to thank his God. These are the greatest moments, when God put on humanity, not only to save us from our sins but to experience life as we do, with all it laughter and tears.

The Pilgrim's Regress by C.S. Lewis. The first book written by C.S. Lewis after his conversion. It is in a sense a record of Lewis's own search for meaning and spiritual satisfaction that eventually led him to Christianity. It is the story of John and his odyssey to an enchanting island which has created in him an intense longing—a mysterious, sweet desire. Though the dragons and giants here are different from those in Bunyan's Pilgrim's Promise, Lewis's allegory performs the same function of enabling the author to say with fantasy and simplicity what would otherwise have demanded a full-length philosophy of religion. In Lewis's skillful hands this fable becomes as effective a Christian apologia as Bunyan's.
