WHAT SHOULD I GIVE UP?

Lent is here . . . I know it seems like Christmas just ended, but Easter is early this year!

For many people, Lent is a time that brings up the annual religious question: "What shall I give up for Lent?" Due more to the peculiarities of our society than to any faith significance, our answers tend to be food (desserts rank high) or television.

I'm not sure either of those is the right answer. I'm not even sure it's answering the right question. Sure, there are some things that God would like us to give up, but I doubt that dessert and television would rank high on that list.

More to the point, I think, is to ask, "What can I do during Lent that will make me more Christ-like, more of the person that God intends me to be?" And if, in trying to answer that question, you come up with a shortage of good responses, let me suggest a few possibilities.

1. Be more positive.

There will always be enough people around who are willing to complain and to point out what's wrong.

What's needed are more people who are willing to cheerfully work hard to make our church warmer and more welcoming, our fellowship more open and more inviting, our evangelism more encouraging, and our stewardship stronger and more faith-revealing.

2. Be more open to change.

Contrary to popular opinion, people want and are excited about change. So let's be more open to change, not change for its own sake, but change that adds meaning and vitality to worship, change that moves us into new ministries, change that challenges us to live faith-filled lives, change that can energize and direct our church into the years ahead.

3. Be more intentional about scheduling some renewal time into each day. I used to believe that multiple nights out and meetings backed up on meetings were an indication of a strong and growing ministry. But I've begun to realize that we make a mistake by trying to pack every minute of every day with something to do.

Instead, let's spend more time with family and friends, or catching up on those books we've wanted to read, or starting that exercise program, or simply relishing the joy of holy leisure lost in thought and prayer.

Just a few suggestions. You probably came up with even better ones on your own. I'd love to hear some of them.

Focal Verse: "For it is by grace you have been


saved, through faith—and this not from

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

LEMOYNE CENTER SUMMER LUNCH PROGRAM - 2021

Over the past several years the Lemoyne Community Center has sponsored a Summer Lunch program to feed people—principally children—a lunch during the summer months. Volunteers support the program by helping to prepare and deliver meals. The Church of the Covenant has been a consistent participant in the program. The Lemoyne Center is beginning planning for its summer lunch program for 2021 (mid-June to mid-August). They had a rough time in 2020 with the sad loss of Joyce Ellis and because of the chaos associated with the pandemic. However, the program will be run again in 2021 to once again feed children a daily lunch meal during the summer.

Steve Thomas, who some may have met last year, will be supervising the lunch program. He was an enthusiastic leader and did much to improve the program in 2020. For 2021, they will use lessons learned from 2020 to improve program efficiency. They are planning to prepare the meals at the Lemoyne Center and deliver them to 14 sites vs. the 24 that were serviced this past year.

The Mission Committee will be asking for volunteers next month to see how we can help this worthy endeavor. Volunteers can help prepare or deliver meals. As we have done in the past, we will focus The Church of the Covenant efforts on one day per week. If this mission project is something you would like to help with, please sign-up next month when we call for volunteers. Your participation will entail only a small amount of time and the work can be accomplished safely. Most importantly, it has real-time meaning to members of the community who have difficulty getting enough to eat.

FROM THE PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE (PNC)

Back on February 7, the PNC distributed an important survey from our consultants at "Holy Cow." It may have reached you by email or in a large flat envelope delivered by the U.S. Mail.

or return the printed copy, if you have not already done so. There is still time for you to complete and return the survey by the closing date, March 3, 2021.

The results of the survey will be compiled and analyzed by the consultant for a report of results to the PNC. The PNC will receive this in an online presentation as well as in a written summary. This latter document will be available to the members in the Church Library as well as by a shorter Executive Summary. The survey is a very important step in our search for a new senior pastor. The results help prepare an outline of "who we are" to put forth in a Ministry Information Form (MIF). The Session must approve the MIF along with the Presbytery and it is the 'first impression' of key information that any prospective candidate will receive about The Church of The Covenant. We hope it will attract the interest of many qualified pastors. Your response is critical.

By participating in the Holy Cow survey, you will have directly contributed to the construction of an important tool your PNC will use to obtain names and qualifications of prospective pastors. The PNC thanks you for your involvement and responsiveness.

MISSION MATTERS

BECOMING DISRUPTERS

In reading of late I have come across 2021 PCUSA materials that focus on "God's *disruptive* rule of love, which intervenes everywhere at all times."* The very word *disrupt* is probably not welcome at the moment because we frankly have had enough disruption. But, if we think about it for a moment and turn it on its head, "Every day we stand before the throne of God, the one who disrupts the



tangles of the world with his kingdom,"* the one who likewise calls us to disrupt—to act in the name of Jesus to feed the hungry, to fight injustice and racism, to assist the poor out of poverty, to support programs that help the addicted. Disruption for good.

Right in line with this idea of disruption is the content of <u>Tightrope</u> (Kristof and WuDunn), currently being studied by Monday Readers. Following exposition of scenarios of communities and generations scarred by low wages, scarce jobs, racial inequity, and the ravages of drugs, the authors offer illustrations of programs that disrupt, to offer hope. One such program resembles Resurrection Power, which is directed by Bob and Kathy Hedges right here in our own community. Their program harnesses the disrupting love of God to offer sustained hope to those recovering from addiction. Ministries and programs that disrupt abound in our own backyard. We are asking you to consider volunteering for the Lemoyne Center summer lunch program; we are asking you to consider involvement and aid to any one of our local mission partners that stand ever in need. Your past generosity has changed lives. We look to a new season of greater hands-on involvement. Please pray for those who labor in the following local mission efforts:

Blood donations typically drop off during and immediately after the winter, which makes March a critical time for the nation's available blood bank supply. Busy holiday schedules, inclement weather and winter illnesses contribute to fewer blood and platelet do



contribute to fewer blood and platelet donations. This poses quite a challenge since the need for blood doesn't take a holiday nor diminish because a snowstorm hits. Although an estimated 38 percent of the U.S. population is eligible to donate blood at any given time, less than 10 percent actually do. Repeat blood donors are critical to maintaining a safe and adequate blood supply. Consider donating blood.
